Comments from the speakers:

Bishop Mackinlay has <u>reflected</u> on his participation in the Synod:

There's real excitement about the journey that we've been part of and the signposts that this will give us for the way forward from here. "We've become very aware of the significance of this across the whole of our Church, and it will play out in very different ways in different places. It's an enormously significant step forward. It's clearly an experience that's been very full of the Holy Spirit and guided by the Holy Spirit. I'm tremendously grateful to have been part of it and look forward to the ongoing journey in this synodal process to which we are so committed.

Dr Cornish had this to say:

Throughout the journey, we've been learning how to be a more synodal Church together, and the process itself has been so important. As one of the facilitators here at the Synod, I feel that this is one of the things that people will take home with them, that we've been learning how to be a synodal Church on mission together. People are going home knowing more people from the universal Church, having heard of so many different contexts and different ways of expressing ourselves as a Church on mission. So I hold a lot of hope for the future.
